

Land Acknowledgement

Virginia Tech acknowledges that we live and work on the Tutelo/ Monacan People's homeland and we recognize their continued relationships with their lands and waterways. We further acknowledge that legislation and practices like the Morrill Act (1862) enabled the commonwealth of Virginia to finance and found Virginia Tech through the forced removal of Native Nations from their lands, both locally and in western states and territories.

We understand that honoring Native Peoples without explicit material commitments falls short of our institutional responsibilities. Through sustained, transparent, and meaningful engagement with the Tutelo/Monacan Peoples, and other Native Nations, we commit to changing the trajectory of Virginia Tech's history by increasing Indigenous students, staff, and faculty recruitment and retention, diversifying course offerings, supporting Native American student organizations and events; and recognizing the growing needs of all Virginia tribes and supporting their sovereignty.

Labor Recognition

ahnr Virginia Tech acknowledges that its Blacksburg campus sits partly on land that was previously the site of the Smithfield and Solitude Plantations, owned by members of the Preston family. Between the 1770s and the 1860s, the Prestons and other local White families that owned parcels of what became Virginia Tech also enslaved hundreds of men, women, and children. We acknowledge that enslaved Black people generated wealth that financed the predecessor institution to Virginia Tech, the Preston and Olin Institute, and they also worked on construction of its building. We further acknowledge that Blacks in the local community played crucial roles in providing services and support to Virginia Tech students, faculty, and staff from its founding. Not until 1953, however, was the first Black student permitted to enroll. Through InclusiveVT, the institutional and individual commitment to Ut Prosim (that I may serve) in the spirit of community, diversity, and excellence, we commit to advancing a more diverse, equitable, and inclusive community.

In the fall of 2017, she began her tenure as a Professor in the Department of English at the University of California, Santa Barbara, where with her artistic partner, Celia Herrera Rodriguez, she has instituted Las Maestras Center: Xicana[x] Indigenous Thought, Art, and Social Praxis. Her most recent memoir, Native Country of the Heart, was published by Farrar, Straus and Giroux. In 2023, Haymarket Books published new, updated anniversary editions of Waiting in the Wings and Loving in the War Years.

MENAH PRATT is the Vice President for Strategic Affairs and Diversity at Virginia Tech. She has almost 25 years of leadership experience in higher education, with a focus on large-scale institutional transformation. Prior to joining Virginia Tech, she held senior leadership positions at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and Vanderbilt University. In addition to being the founder of FWCA, she also founded the Black College Institute, a summer leadership program for 600 rising junior and senior high school students, hosted at Virginia Tech.

Nationally and internationally recognized author of four books on issues of race, class, gender, culture, diversity, education, women's leadership, and critical race feminism, Dr. Pratt was named chair-elect for the Council on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion for the American Public Land-Grant University Association in 2023, and to the board of the National Association of Diversity Officers in Higher Education in 2024.

Her most recent book, *Blackwildgirl*: A Writer's Journey to Take Back her Superpower, is a powerful and transformational autobiography of her life journey from Black girlhood to Black womanhood in America. A poet, public speaker, scholar-activist, and blogger at www.menahpratt.com, her life's work reflects a commitment to helping others actualize their potential to serve humanity.

Gabi earned her Ph.D. and M.A. in Sociology from Harvard University, and her B.S. in Social Work and American Indian Studies from Cornell University. For over thirty years, she has served on staff and boards of numerous human rights organizations centering energy on global indigenous movements. Gabi continuously mentors indigenous/Latinx youth and families through a culturally grounded tribal approach incorporating historic consciousness and land-based practices. Her scholarly research focuses on hemispheric American Indian identity, collective identity, indigenous religions, and social movements, maintaining a regional specialization in the Chesapeake Bay. Gabi served on MAI's staff for 18 years as first education director and then as a historian, curating major exhibitions and programs. Following a call to deepen commitments to knowledge legacies, Gabi took a two-year journey to uplift the voices of indigenous elder women leaders, sponsored by Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors prior to settling back at home. She has also received several national awards including the 2023-2024 American Council on Education Fellowship, 2024 and 2023 Top 50 Women We Admire in Virginia, and 2023 Individual Winds of Change award by the Forum on Workplace Inclusion.

She has a bachelor's degree from the University of Iowa and two master's degrees – one in Literary Studies from the University of Iowa and one in Sociology from Vanderbilt University. She also earned her Ph.D. and J.D. from Vanderbilt University. A former federal court of appeals law clerk, Dr. Pratt is licensed to practice law in Illinois and Tennessee, with expertise in real estate, construction law, affirmative action, equal employment opportunity, disability, and governance.

Her most recent book, *Blackwildgirl: A Writer's Journey to Take Back her Superpower*, is a powerful and transformational autobiography of her life journey from Black girlhood to Black womanhood in America.
